TLERC had its annual board meeting in Midland, Texas on June 21, 2014 at 2:00PM. Officers elected for the next year were: PDG Ron Knott – President S-3, Lion Tom Stanley-Vice President S-4, PID Marshall Cooper- Treasury, PDG Claude Durham- Secretary, Lion Leroy Wagner – Accountant for TLERC. PDG Carolyn Keskitalo will continue to serve as CEO. As report was given by the constitution and by-laws committee with no suggested changes. A state of the facility report was presented by the CEO. The meeting adjourned at 4:55 PM.

Priorities Established:

Raise \$60,000 to retire a debt incurred with the purchase of the bunkhouse. There are different levels of awards based on the amount given to honor Lions in your club for all of their hard work

Educate the Lions of Texas of what we do and how we go about doing it. We are a recognized Council of Governors charity.

Establish a core group of volunteers to work at the center on a daily basis. Lions clubs, High School Leos (in and around the area), church groups and other civic organizations. The Center once had a strong base of volunteers. Work days and projects are open seven days a week. There is always something to do at the Center.

Add companies that are friends of TLERC. Southwestern Motor Freight has moved glasses and supplies as far away as New York City and New Jersey, soon to Oklahoma and all throughout Texas. I am working with Adams Extract and Unifirst Systems for improved storage containers to facilitate storage of large volume of glasses outside.

Grow the children's' eyeglass program.

Expand the Pedia- vision program.

Ask your Director to do programs with you. I will do programs for you as well.

My Exchange in Italy: Che bella!

One of the many things I learned from this trip is that time really flies. I first heard about this wonderful opportunity at the end of November 2013 from my current Spanish teacher who recommended it to me. Next thing I knew, it was June 21, 2014 and I was at the Midland International Airport trying to convince my mom not to cry as we hugged goodbye. I would be gone for one month. Luckily for my mom, that month flew by and I returned home July 19 with a large Italian vocabulary and many exciting stories to share.

For the first six days of my time in Northern Italy, I stayed with my first host family: the Vernile's. I lived with a host mother, father, grandmother, and two sisters, Cristina (17) and Anna (16). In addition, they had a dog named Trilly, who they claimed was not a Corgi, even though she looked exactly like one. They lived in a small town on a lake called Iseo. My first day with them included my host mother taking my host sisters and me around Iseo. We even took a boat to Monte Isola, which was located in the middle of the lake. During my stay with the Vernile's, I got to visit the cities of Iseo, Brescia, Sarnico, and Milan. Every night, the family prepared a nice dinner consisting of typical Italian food (mainly different types of pasta). When I wasn't visiting different cities, I was relaxing at the lake, gelato in my hand, with Anna, Cristina, and all of their friends. As an only child, I can honestly say I would not mind it if Anna and Cristina were my real sisters. It was a joy getting to spend six days with the Vernile's. I only wish my time with them would have been longer!

I spent the next ten days with my second host family: the Rossi's. I lived with two host parents, a sister named Chiara (19), and a brother named Francesco (17). They also had a dog named Luna. They lived in a medium sized town called Mantova. My first day with them consisted of a visit to the *Palazzo Ducale di Mantova*, which was the residence of the royal Gonzaga family between the 14th and the 17th century. During my stay with the Rossi's, I got to visit Mantova, Venice, and Milan. Venice was by far my favorite Italian city. Unfortunately, we did not ride a gondola due to expensive pricing. However, that didn't matter, for I had already fallen in love with San Marco Square, which consists of St. Mark's Basilica, the Clock Tower, and many different shops. The day of our trip to Venice, I bought my mom a gold cameo for her birthday, which passed during my stay in Italy. When the family and I stayed in Mantova, we would go out to eat, go shopping, or go swimming. One day, my host siblings took me to a water park, where I got to meet all of their friends. That night, we threw a huge surprise party for Chiara, who had just finished her major exams. Overall, I think the Rossi's really showed me the Italian lifestyle and culture by introducing me to many special people and places.

I spent my last ten days at a Lion's Camp: Campo Dei Laghi (Camp of the Lakes). There, I met seventeen other exchange students from countries all over the world, including Finland, the Ukraine, and Estonia. While at the camp, I got to revisit the cities of Venice, Mantova, and Brescia. While in Brescia, the campers got divided into groups to go on a treasure hunt. One of the clues was located atop the old Castle and I have to say that walking up the steps to that castle was the most painful experience. Fortunately, it was worth it because the team I was on won by a landslide. The camp also took us to Verona, where we went on a tour and saw an opera at the Arena. Unfortunately, it began to rain, so we left early. We even spent one day at Gardaland, Italy's best amusement park. Throughout our stay at the camp, everyone had to give a country presentation. I worked alongside the two other American girls in creating a PowerPoint that talked about the United States, as well as our individual states. One morning, the camp took part in a ceremony with the mayor of Castellaro (Castellaro was a tiny city where the camp was located). The final day at the camp consisted of visiting a center where dogs are trained to guide the blind. Afterwards, we got to go shopping at the Orio center in Bergamo. That night was the final party. Everyone's host families were invited too. Everyone got dressed up to have an outdoor dinner with their host families and fellow campers. After dinner, there was music and dancing. It is fair to say that no one got any sleep that night, especially me, for the party didn't end until the next morning and I had the earliest flight. The following morning, I couldn't help but cry as I said goodbye not only to my fellow campers, but to Italy itself.

I would like to thank the Midland West side, Downtown, and Suburban Lion's Clubs for sponsoring me on this wonderful trip. I would also like to thank everyone from the Northside Lion's Club, especially Mark Singh, for helping me prepare for this trip. I am so glad I got to take part in this once in a lifetime experience and I hope every youth gets the chance to visit a place where they can have fun, meet new people, and make memories.
