Waiting in terminal 4A's departure line at Bush Intercontinental Airport, I began to feel a little apprehensive. I'm not exactly worried, but the fact that my first flight alone will be a nine hour trans-Atlantic journey is slightly discomforting, and the proposition that I will know no one upon arrival makes me somewhat anxious. In fact, I began to wonder if I really want to go spend the last three weeks of summer in a place thousands of miles from home, and ponder if it is too late to turn back now. Then the loudspeaker calls for boarding to begin.

This past summer, I was given the unique opportunity to travel abroad on the Lions Clubs International youth exchange program. Founded in 1961 with the initiative of promoting global understanding and cooperation, the program has given thousands of youth the chance to experience destinations around the world, where they are hosted by Lions members and attend camps with other international students. For my three week trip, I choose to travel to Munich, Germany, where I would stay one week with German host parents followed by a two week youth camp. I truly had no idea what to expect, yet could not be more eager and excited to find out.

For the first week of the visit, I stayed and traveled with my host parents, Uli and Aliya, who lived in the 3,000 person town of Marquartstein about an hour outside of Munich. From the first day, they were intent on showing me all Bavaria had to offer, with outings such as visits to local craft festivals, a day hike to a nearby palace, and multiple drives to the Chiemsee, a lake renowned for its beauty and quality of water. I even attended German school for three days where I collaborated with students to organize their end of year *Projekttag*. My favorite memory of the entire trip came the day that we visited Salzburg, Austria. After viewing handwritten manuscripts at Mozart's childhood home, we were whisked up Festungsbahn Hill on a tram to experience the Hohensalzburg Fortress, the largest preserved citadel in Central Europe. And while the palace was spectacular, the view of the city was even more breathtaking, with red-roofed houses and patina domed churches dominating the skyline. Yet even then, my cultural immersion was just beginning.

I enjoyed the first week of my stay so much that it was with reluctance that I left my host family for the youth camp which was to follow. On the morning of August 1, I boarded a high speed train with eighteen students from fifteen different countries and traveled to the town of Scheidegg, a remote municipality where we would spend our first week as a group. The dynamics started out awkwardly, but the students came together very quickly, aided by activities such as zip line building, rock climbing, and a six people per room policy. Nightly meetings included team building games and discussions, and each student gave a country presentation about life and customs in his or her homeland. This first week spent in the Bavarian countryside proved to be vital to the success of the group for the rest of the trip.

Our next week in Germany took us to two cities, first to Bad Tölz and finally to Munich itself. In both places, we enjoyed activities such as bike tours, river rafting, sailing, and made a special detour to visit the Nazi concentration camp Dachau. In Bad Tölz, we learned about German history while completing a geocaching scavenger hunt, and in Munich had free reign to explore the world's largest science and



technology museum, the Deutsches Museum. And the "Land of Beer and Pretzels" did not disappoint in the food category, with not only a delicious selection of meats and sausages, but hearty staples such as potatoes, dumplings, and kraut. The best part of the trip, however, was making lasting friendships with youth from all over the world. While this may seem cliché, these are the types of acquaintances that not only forge a stronger understanding of diverse cultures, but also promote the type of courteous relationships required for international cooperation. So for this incredible opportunity, I would like to give a big *Vielen Dank* to the Midland Northside Lions Club.

Texas Lions Camp is a summer camp dedicated to serving children from the state of Texas with physical disabilities, type-1 diabetes and cancer between the ages of seven and sixteen. This past summer 1520 children from across Texas enjoyed a fun filled week at camp. The camp is a modern facility located on over 500 acres outside of Kerrville in the beautiful Texas Hill Country. Texas Lions Camp offers campers a chance to try new activities and create long lasting friendships while developing self-esteem, independence, and most of all, they get to have fun!

Children eligible for this program include, but are not limited to, children who are hearing impaired or deaf, visually impaired or blind, have a missing limb, birth defects, cerebral palsy, arthritis, muscular dystrophy, cancer, asthma, heart conditions, and many others. One camp session is for children with Down syndrome ages 12 to 16. Two sessions are provided for children who have type-1 diabetes ages 8 to 15.

Learning can take on many forms and Teas lions Camp is a unique experience for many campers in the types of challenges presented. Counselors are assigned to each group of campers and escort them throughout the session, teaching and encouraging campers while meeting their special needs. Another key lesson is learning that everyone has a 'disability'; some are just more obvious than others.

The goal of Texas Lions Camp is to help children become more independent, productive adults. The programs of the Texas Lions Camp are intended to develop such qualities as improved self-image, social adjustment and self-reliance. These services are offered to campers at no charge to them or their families.

Don't Ask IF You Don't Mean It



Retention is NOT an Afterthought By Council Chairman Tom Blasé

For the last 2 months we have been concentrating on the 2 parts of the **re-MEMBER Texas** Recruiting prong: The 1st involves **YOU** as individual members. This is the wooden nickel program. **Have you earned your commemorative coin for giving away 1 wooden nickel?** The other involves your club, as a group of members, under the direction of your Membership Director. This component is all about making a recruiting plan for the year and then putting it into action. **Has your Club put a plan into action yet?**

If you haven't been keeping up, **re-MEMBER Texas** is our Texas membership plan for 2015-16. The plan is built around three main tenets: **Recruit, Retain, & Rebuild.** The **re-MEMBER Texas kit** contains two important pieces in it to help you with your recruiting plan: The **re-MEMBER Texas News**, a 14 page newspaper full of ideas & Guides for your club. The **re-MEMBER Texas News** can also be found on the Texas website (www.texaslions.org), but if you have not received your kit from your District Governor call him/her and ask for it.

This month we want to start talking getting serious about the second part of **re-MEMBER Texas**: Retention. How many times have we all gotten ourselves in trouble by making an offer we didn't mean? You know, something like, "Next time you are in town, call me we'll go eat", or "Drop by anytime", or maybe the worst of all to us as Lions, "Come join my Lions Club."

Now it's OK to ask, in fact your club NEEDS you to ask people to join, but when we look at the records and see how many people quit because the club was nothing like you promised or the club did not meet up to their expectations of what a service club is supposed to be. You would likely be shocked to see the number of new Texas Lions who quit their club in the first two years (many in just a few months). Sadly it is usually our own fault. Did we not really mean it when we promised them a great experience in serving others?

Keeping members consists of 2 main things: 1) Making them feel wanted by the members and 2) making them feel needed & useful in the service goals of your club. The second part is more a function of your club itself & its leadership, and a topic for a later time, but the first is <u>your responsibility</u>. If you want your new member to become a permanent part of your club they need a lot of TLC. Call & remind them of meetings & projects. Offer to pick them up. Make sure they are not sitting alone at a table. Make sure your Club has a thorough orientation program, if not do it yourself. Appoint a mentor and enroll your new Lion in the mentoring courses. Make sure they are inducted with a meaningful ceremony.

The "New Member Induction Ceremonies" & Lions New Member Orientation Guide" are the 2 main guides you will find for the Retention component of the **re-MEMBER Texas** plan. Once again, if you do not have your kit yet, look up the **re-MEMBER Texas** News on the Texas website (www.texaslions.org) and go to page 8. This page will show you all 5 guides with step by step instructions on getting your own set sent to you by LCI. (By the way, if you don't have your kit or wooden nickels yet, call your District Governor to get them.)

It has often been said that Lions do not have a recruiting problem, we have a RETENTION problem. We recruit thousands of new Texas Lions every year; and either lose more than that or barely make a gain. How great would it be if we concentrated on giving these new members what they wanted when they agreed to join? Texas Lionism would grow once again by the thousands......more members mean more SERVICE.

The responsibility to <u>Just Ask 1</u> is each of ours, but <u>when</u> you do make a commitment to make Lionism a great experience for your new member and MEAN it!

Progress Causing Upheaval in Downtown Midland Original Convention Venue No Longer Tenable

Major demolition projects by the City of Midland over the next few months will make room for a new Convention Center, more hotels and additional parking in the middle of downtown. The projects are directly across the street and surrounding the original Texas Lions host hotel.

The demolition includes tearing down the current Midland Center, which would have been the site for several of the meals, seminars & workshops of the 2016 MD2 State Convention. In addition to the construction disturbance, the loss of the center would require using other venues some distance away. The original hotel is also using the opportunity to eliminate the majority of its attached parking spaces to make room for a 3 story parking garage. They will make use of the Convention Center parking 2 blocks away, since this will be unused during construction of the new center.

The Convention Committee felt that having to frequently drive to other venues when the parking would be blocks away from the hotel would not make the convention very pleasant. The committee decided to select an alternate site.



However, if we want to have a great convention in 2A1, we have to start planning now. One of the goals of next year's Council of Governors is to make this convention even more appealing to the grassroots Lions in Texas. For the last 3 years the Councils have been trying to offer things to attract younger members to see what Texas Lionism is really all about. - Plant Life
- Weather Phenomenon
- Special Theme: Dignity, harmony, humanity: Celebrating the peaceful coexistence of species.

The impartial judging of photos should focus on originality, artistic merit, and portrayal of the environmental theme.

- LIONS CLUBS select and submit one winning photo to the district.
- LIONS DISTRICTS select and submit one 8" x 10" printed photo to the multiple district prior to **February 4, 2016**. Photos may be mailed to reach the state office prior to this date or delivered to the contest coordinator in Kerrville Thursday, February 4th.
- LIONS MULTIPLE DISTRICTS select and submit one winning photo to the international contest. **March 1, 2016** is the deadline for multiple districts to submit one 8" x 10" printed photograph and an official entry form (available on the Lions Web site) signed by the council chairperson to Lions Headquarters.
- LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL will display multiple district-level entries at the annual Lions international convention. Registered convention attendees will vote for their favorite photos. An award will be presented to the winning photographers. The six (the five category winners and the Best of Show) winning photos will appear on the Lions Web site.

NOTE: Multiple entries will not be accepted, please limit to one photo entry per district.
