

TEXAS LIONS LOOKING FOR CAMPERS FOR 2016

Texas Lions Camp is a summer camp dedicated to serving children from the state of Texas with physical disabilities, type-1 diabetes and cancer between the ages of seven and sixteen. **This past summer 1520 children from across Texas enjoyed a fun filled week at camp.** The camp is a modern facility located on over 500 acres outside of Kerrville in the beautiful Texas Hill Country. Texas Lions Camp offers campers a chance to try new activities and create long lasting friendships while developing greater self-esteem, independence, and most of all, they get to have FUN! Children eligible for the Texas Lions Camp summer program includes children age 7 to 16 with physical disabilities. Eligible children include, but are not limited to, children who are hearing impaired or deaf, visually impaired or blind, have a missing limb, birth defects, cerebral palsy, arthritis, muscular dystrophy, cancer, asthma, heart conditions and others. One camp session is for children with Down syndrome ages 12 to 16. Two sessions are provided for children who have type-1 diabetes ages 8 to 15.

Learning can take on many forms and Texas Lions Camp is a unique experience for many campers in the types of challenges presented. Counselors are assigned to each group of campers and escort them throughout the session, teaching and encouraging campers while meeting their special needs. Another key lesson is learning that everyone has a 'disability'; some are just more obvious than others

The goal of Texas Lions Camp is to help children become more independent, productive adults. The programs of the Texas Lions Camp are intended to develop such qualities as improved self-image, social adjustment and self-reliance. These services are offered to campers at no charge to them or their families.

1. Registration for Camp started in January. You still have time to identify kids that might be eligible to attend this summer. All the info needed on what camps are available and registration forms are on the Camp web site--lionscamp.com.

2. Hiring of counselors for this summer is well underway. The Camp will be hiring approximately 150/160 counselors. When talking to parents, let them know that there is almost 1 counselor per camper.

3. During the 2 camps for kids with type 1 diabetes, their families attend an informative seminar dinner with leading endocrinologist, Dr. Stephen Ponder prior to the week's awards ceremony.

4. Tours of the Camp are available throughout the year and on Fridays at 3PM and 4 PM during the summer camper sessions.

5. Don't forget the Camp Work Days. They are March 5, April 2, and May 7. You can go to the camp web site to sign up.

6. 100% contribution to the Camp is an additional 10\$ per club member. This is in addition to the \$10.50 per member you are billed by the Camp. At least one Club that has contributed has not shown up on my monthly report from the Camp. The following Clubs are on my report: Ballinger Noon, Colorado City, Midland Northside, Midland West Side, San Angelo Concho Pearl, San Angelo North by Northwest and Sweetwater. If you have made a 100% contribution and are not one of these Clubs, let me know so I can compare your club with the report I get If you are not on my list, I will work with the Camp to get you credit for your 100% contribution.

re-MEMBER Texas -PREVENT CHILD ABUSE

No fancy title this month. No play on words..... because this topic is no laughing matter. For those who have been following along the last 7 months, as we took apart and analyzed **re-MEMBER Texas'** 3 parts, being involved in more visible & relevant service was important in making these processes successful. It is this **re-MEMBER Texas** plan that has led your Council of Governors to tackle the **Prevention of Child Abuse**.

For those who have not been following along, **re-MEMBER Texas** is **our** Texas membership plan for 2015-16. The plan is built around three main tenets: **Recruit, Retain, & Rebuild.** The **re-Member Texas kit** contains two important items in it to help you with your recruiting plan: The **re-Member Texas News**, a 14 page newspaper full of ideas & several guides for your club to help in the process. If you don't have one, the **re-Member Texas News** can also be found on the Texas website <u>www.texaslions.org</u>.

One of the most critical things we have learned in analyzing these 3 prongs is that it's hard to recruit the younger generations and it's almost impossible to retain them (when they do join), if we are not involved in causes or if we are not performing service that is pertinent to their world. A second critical point is that we don't get enough PR – many young people do not even know who or what LIONS are.

Early on, the Council's membership committee felt that we needed to find some service plan that would not only be relevant and important to today's society, but that could also garner a lot of notice for the Lions Clubs of Texas. To make a long story short, that turned out to be working with **Prevent Child Abuse Texas** in fighting this terrible blight in our Texas communities.

How could we go wrong? It's a cause that gets major attention. It is a critical problem that young people want to solve. It will help us attract new members (who want to fight this blight) – and most of all we likely will save a child's life!

Wear the Blue

What is this about wearing blue? The color of Prevent Child Abuse is blue & the special month is April. Blue balloons & blue pinwheels are used as symbols of their campaign. Each pinwheel, balloon or even a blue ribbon is used to represent one reported case of child abuse in your community. Check out your Texas Governors and other Texas Lions wearing the blue last year (re-MEMBER Texas, page 1).

So what can your Club do? You can plan an event during the month of April that draws attention to the problem. Send out press releases, invite the public & the town dignitaries, hand out prevent child abuse material, invite the press. There are all sorts of ideas on page 5 of the re-MEMBER Texas News (go to www.texaslions.org) & Prevent Child Abuse has several info sheets on their website with facts & figures you can print to hand out at your event (www.preventchildabuse.org). There is a Prevent Child Abuse press release already made for you on page 10. But don't forget to have brochures and flyers about Lionism and your club....and don't be afraid to hand people an application. Page 14 of re-MEMBER Texas has plenty of different recruiting brochures with instructions on how to order them. Get your order in now so you will have them for April.

To help out, Lamar advertising companies will be displaying a special Lions/Prevent Child Abuse digital billboard all across the state, as often as possible, throughout April. Use this extra PR to build your own event. See page 5 of the **re-MEMBER Texas News** to see the billboard artwork. Your District Governors are currently working with the local Lamar plants throughout the state to get as much exposure as we can from the local branches.

What if all 875+ Texas Clubs did something in April? The PR would reverberate around the state; we could attract hundreds of new Lionsand best of all, how many kids would be saved another beating, sexual assault or even worse? LIONS, WEAR THE BLUE this April!





Why Partner with Prevent Child Abuse?

Lions Clubs International was founded upon the concept of service to our communities. To this day a major focus is service that helps children in some way. In Texas our shining ex-

ample of course is the Texas Lions Camp. Lions throughout the state also serve youth by providing glasses, medical care, diabetes awareness, and fun activities for children like "beep Easter Egg hunts". On a world-wide effort we help control or eradicate measles and river blindness through distribution of medicine. The key though is "We Serve". As I have visited clubs, the single driving force to attract and retain members is that of service. Last year, IP Joe Preston challenged us to "Strengthen the Pride (Lions) through service". I firmly believe that by identifying areas of need within their area, clubs offer opportunities for men and women to join in service through membership in local Lions Clubs.

So let's look at one area within our state that clubs could "Strengthen our Pride". Back in the early 1970's my wife (Pat) and I were foster parents for 3 years. Children were placed in our home in that period from anywhere to 2 days to 2 ½ years. They came from homes that under any definition were ones of child neglect or abuse. Prevent Child Abuse Texas (PCATX) is a statewide non-profit organization working to prevent child abuse and neglect in all its forms throughout Texas.

The 2015-16 Council of Governors has moved to partner with PCATX by requesting <u>each</u> club in Texas to have an event, a program or a project that supports the goal of PCATX to prevent child abuse and neglect in all its forms throughout Texas in the month of April 2016. Going back to my belief of service leads to membership growth, I would recommend that clubs use these events to publicize their clubs and provide information for membership. The Council will be working to get statewide publicity for Lions in partnership with PCATX.

Serve first, but also let people know what you do and why you serve. Then offer membership in Lions for others also interested in serving. Why partner? It's a win-win for all of us!

A Problem & A Need Leads To Service Opportunities

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month in Texas. According to Prevent Child Abuse Texas, 4 children die every day from child abuse, 27 children die from poverty, every day 689 babies are born with inadequate prenatal care and every day 13,700 children are abused and neglected in the USA.

A 2004 report titled "What Can We Do About Child Abuse" prepared by the Office of then Attorney General Greg Abbott with the cooperation of Texas CASA, Inc. revealed more than 50,000 Texas children were known to be victims of abuse and neglect.

In 2010, the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services confirmed over 66,000 children to be victims of child abuse, 16,347 children were removed from homes due to child abuse.

"Staggering as these numbers may seem the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services, the state agency charged with receiving and investigating reports of child abuse and neglect reports reflect many more cases of abuse and neglect go unreported and others are not reported in a manner that supports effective investigation".

Although non-profit organizations such as Prevent Child Abuse Texas, Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA), strive to prevent child abuse and advocate for children who have been abused, Lions realize more needs to be done.

To this end, the Lions of Texas Multiple District 2, led by its sixteen (16) District Governors and over 25,000 Lions Clubs members, will join Prevent Child Abuse Texas, next April (2016) during Prevent Child Abuse Month in Texas.

Lions in all 850+ clubs will be encouraged to get involved with local organizations working to prevent child abuse by participating in activities such as "Wear Blue Day", holding informative programs, participating in walks and many other activities to promote awareness, educate the public, and demonstrate how much they care about prevention of child abuse.





Wear Blue Month – April, 2016 What Your Club Can Do to Help Prevent Child Abuse By DG Ed Stiles S1

In April of 2016, the Lions of Texas will be partnering with the Prevent Child Abuse Texas organization to promote Child Abuse Prevention Month and shine a light on the frightening number of child abuse cases in our great state, and put into action some things Lions can do to help prevent it from continuing.

The promotion, propelled by the active participation of hundreds of Lions Clubs across Texas, should generate a huge groundswell of publicity with multiple implications - increasing awareness of child abuse to millions of Texans, generating interest among other service-minded citizens, and informing the general public about who we Lions are and what we do.

So, how can your club get involved? Here are a few ideas...

"Pinwheels for Prevention" Campaign

As the new symbol for child abuse and neglect prevention, the pinwheel is an uplifting reminder of childhood and the bright futures all children deserve. This national campaign is an effort to change the way our nation thinks about prevention and how we can deliver on our commitment to America's children.

The Pinwheels for Prevention campaign can be promoted in many different ways. Pinwheels can be carried, given out at events, planted as a lawn display, lined up along a sidewalk or pathway, or used in any number of ways to raise awareness of child abuse prevention and the promise that every child deserves to be raised in a safe and nurturing home. Several sources for the purchase of pinwheels are available on the internet.

Other Opportunities

 \cdot Wear blue. Ask your club members to wear blue clothing at every opportunity during the month of April. Have volunteers make simple blue Prevent Child Abuse ribbons for club members, give more to others in the community, and wear them every day in April.

 \cdot Schedule a club event with a speaker on child abuse prevention. Invite local dignitaries, the press and the public to attend. Put PSA's out to all the media to generate interest. Make sure you have a club information table, manned by Lions from your club to provide information on your club's activities, brochures about Lionism (free from Lions Clubs International), and applications to join.

Wear Blue Month – April, 2016 (Continued) What Your Club Can Do to Help Prevent Child Abuse By DG Ed Stiles S1

Participate in a walk. Two annual walks in April are the 'Round Rock Walk for Children' and the 'Walk The Woodlands for Children'. Encourage your club to sponsor a walk in your own town. Make sure you have a club information table, manned by Lions from your club, to provide information on your club's activities, brochures about Lionism (free from Lions Clubs International), and applications to join.

 \cdot Encourage your members to be on the alert for abusive situations in your community – not just in April, but at all times. Report suspected abuse or neglect. If anyone has reason to believe a child has been or may be harmed, have them immediately call the local Child Protective Services (CPS) agency or call 911.

 \cdot Identify people in your area who could use a break from parenting. Being a parent isn't easy. Offer a helping hand to take care of the children, so the parent(s) can rest or spend time together.

 \cdot Challenge your club to get more involved in your community. Ask your community leaders, clergy, library and schools to develop services to meet the needs of healthy children and families. Strong, healthy families are less likely to be involved in child abuse.

 \cdot Assign a committee or a group of member volunteers to help in developing parenting resources at your local library. Ask them to determine whether your local library has parenting resources, and if it does not, offer help to obtain some.

 \cdot Have your club promote abuse prevention programs in your local schools. Teaching children, parents and teachers prevention strategies can help to keep children safe.

• Encourage Lions club members to volunteer at a local child abuse prevention program if one exists. For information about volunteer opportunities, go to the Prevent Child Abuse Texas website (www.preventchildabusetexas.org) and click on the Volunteers tab, or call 1-800-CHILDREN.

Progress Causing Upheaval in Downtown Midland Original Convention Venue

No Longer Tenable Major demolition projects by the City of Midland over the next few months will make room for a new Convention Center, more hotels and additional parking in the middle of downtown. The projects are directly across the street and surrounding the original Texas Lions host hotel.

The demolition includes tearing down the current Midland Center, which would have been the site for several of the meals. seminars & workshops of the 2016 MD2 State Convention. In addition to the construction disturbance, the loss of the center would require using other venues some distance away. The original hotel is also using the opportunity to eliminate the majority of its attached parking spaces to make room for a 3 story parking garage. They will make use of the Convention Center parking 2 blocks away, since this will be unused during construction of the new center.

The Convention Committee felt that having to frequently drive to other venues when the parking would be blocks away from the hotel would not make the convention very pleasant. The committee decided to select an alternate site.



Using the system and building templates (that can be used for any configuration) of the Texas Ramp Project, you will learn how to take a "pre-vetted" lead in your town, develop a site plan, and then actually build a ramp. The classroom seminar starts Thursday (1 PM) at the hotel. The crew will pre-build and then assemble a ramp on location throughout Friday & Saturday with time allotted to attend the meals and hear the special speakers. Bring work clothes.
