

Besides business, plans for a great time are being made. I am looking forward to enjoying the weekend with everyone in attendance.



RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Lions Clubs International is celebrating the 100th anniversary of its founding in 2017 and this occasion provides an ideal opportunity to honor the Lions of Texas for their good works; and

WHEREAS, Established in 1917 by Melvin Jones as the Association of Lions Clubs, the community service organization held its first national convention that year in Dallas, with 12 of the 23 participating clubs hailing from Texas; the Lions adopted a prime mission a decade later when Helen Keller urged them to become "Knights of the Blind;" through the years, the organization has undertaken numerous initiatives benefiting the visually impaired while also carrying out many other humanitarian efforts; and

WHEREAS, The Lions of Texas have dedicated themselves to supporting such national programs as Sight for Kids, which has provided nearly 20 million screenings, and SightFirst, which raises funds for cataract operations and for programs to fight the other major causes of blindness; in addition, Texas Lions have introduced a number of effective initiatives, among them Journey for Sight and the Juvenile Diabetes Program; the Midland Lions became the first regional recycling center for collecting glasses to send abroad to those in need, and the Lions of Texas have formed five eye banks to assist in the collection and distribution of comeas for transplantation and medical research; and

WHEREAS, Since 1949, the Texas Lions Camp has welcomed approximately 70,000 children with physical disabilities and diabetes, providing horseback riding, swimming, campouts, and other outdoor activities; the Lions of Texas also support disaster relief, anti-drug campaigns, and vaccination programs; and

WHEREAS, Many Texas Lions have served in key leadership roles with the parent organization, which today has 1.4 million members in over 200 locations around the world; Lions Club International was named the top nongovernmental agency in the world by the United Nations in 2012; and

WHEREAS, Embodying the motto "We Serve," which has guided Lions Clubs International for more than four decades, the members of the Lions of Texas have made a lasting, positive impact across the state and beyond, and they are truly deserving of special recognition in this centennial year; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate of the 85th Texas Legislature hereby honor the Lions of Texas on the occasion of the 100th anniversary of the founding of Lions Clubs International and extend to the members sincere best wishes for continued success in their important endeavors; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That an official copy of this resolution be prepared for the Lions of Texas as an expression of high regard by the Texas Senate.

Follow up on the Western Texas Eye Bank.

A couple of months ago I wrote in the newsletter about the issue facing the eye bank. At that time, we expressed the opinion that the historical flow of donated cornea would return to what it was in the past. That is what seems to be happening. Six donations have been received and placed in January / February to date. All indications are that our eye bank will be operating as a non-profit, where the combination of fees earned plus Lions donations will equal expenses.

Some explanation on our eye bank process. The eye bank and individual surgeons reach an agreement where the surgeon agrees to get all their cornea to transplant from our eye bank and the eye bank agrees to supply them with all the cornea they need. When the surgeon needs cornea they call the eye bank. The eye bank looks at our inventory to see if we can fill the need. If yes we do. If not, our eye bank sources it from another eye bank. This is good for the surgeon as they don't have to source it themselves. This is good for us because we get first chance to fill the need. If we fill the need we earn a little over \$3,000 for processing the cornea. If we source from another eye bank we get about \$800 for doing the sourcing.

Our operating expenses are about \$7,500 per month, so three supplied cornea cover operating expenses. In addition to that, we have need for funds to replace fixed assets and comply with changing regulations that apply to eye banks. The donor flow of cornea are not consistent – one month might be 4 and the next zero. For this reason the eye bank needs funds in the bank. Currently we have about \$34,000. This is about 4 months excluding any funds for fixed assets or regulatory requirements. The funds in the bank are about \$50,000 less than historical.

We feel the need to rebuild our cash position so when the next "abnormal" event comes we are able to survive.

I wish to thank those clubs who have stepped up with a contribution. I encourage all clubs to look at their coming year budget and try set aside some funds for this purpose,



HELP CELEBRATE THE CENTENNIAL OF "LIONISM"

As we approach Lion Year 2017/2018, we are coming upon the 100 year anniversary of LIONS. The exact date is October 8, 2017. We all need to remember those 44 gentlemen that met at the Adolphus Hotel in Dallas on 8 October 1917. From that meeting came the Charter for the "International Association of Lions". Times have changed since then, but our moto of "We Serve" continues to lead us today. The Texas Centennial Celebration will be held in Dallas next October 6 and 7th. Details will be provided after the first of the year. For our older clubs, look at your original Charter and see who signed it. If it was signed by Melvin Jones, I would like a copy. The copy will be framed and on display at the Celebration in Dallas. If you have any other memorabilia that you could share let me know. There will be a room with security for all items on display. Did you know that PIP Ebb is writing a book on the second 50 years of Lionism. It should be on sale by summer.

Lions International has devoted a lot of time and effort to promote the "Centennial Celebration". If you go to <u>lionsclubs.org</u> and click on Lions 100, you will can get sensory overload from all the information that is provided. The point of this is to get all our Clubs involved in the Centennial Celebration. There are several parts to the Celebration.

One of those is a <u>Centennial Community Legacy Project</u>. The purpose of this is to connect with your community by giving a visible "gift" that commemorates the Lions Centennial and creates a lasting Legacy of your service to the community. A "gift" or project does not have to be elaborate or expensive. It can be as simple as a Lions Logo sign outside of your meeting location. Projects are defined in three levels and have until June 30, 2018 to be completed. So far we have 3 completed Legacy Projects with 5 more in progress. That means that 40 of our Clubs have not worked on a Legacy Project.

A second part of the Celebration is the <u>Centennial Service Challenge</u>. This effort has been ongoing since July 2014. Many of our Club have received recognition for their efforts in 1 or all 4 of the Centennial Service Challenge areas. They are: <u>Engaging our Youth</u>: Get youth involved in the Peace Poster contest, Outstanding Youth contest, and other District Youth programs. <u>Sharing the Vision</u>: Support vision screening and educational events that discuss the medical issues that can lead to blindness. <u>Relieving the Hunger</u>: Support a local food bank, deliver meals to the elderly, support a local school "Backpack Buddies" program. <u>Protecting the Environment</u>: Protect and improve the environment to make your community a healthier place to live in. Coordinate with TXDoT and do a highway trash cleanup. Partner with others in the community to do a bulk household waste collection. Centennial Service Challenge projects can be reported each year. So far this year, only 13 Clubs have reported Service Challenge Projects to LCI. That means that 35 of our Clubs have not reported on the Service that they have done. I know that you have done more, but YOU need to report them. The LCI reporting instructions are included in the District Newsletter.

Another part of the Centennial Celebration is membership. District Governor Dave Richison is working this effort and you should have already seen the goals that he has established for the District.

Look at the LCI web page and click on Lions 100. The tool box contains tons of info.


