

## LIBRARY GETS A SECOND CHANCE

As the final school bell rang at San Angelo's Colored School, dozens of black students would dash across the street to the Dunbar Library, where they could finish homework — and check out the cute boys and girls, of

Robert Butler, who was an elementary student in the 1940s, remembers the library – which was for "Negroes only" — first opened at the Mason Temple on the north side of town in 1932. Funding was provided in 1940 so a physical structure could be built at 9th Street and North Ran-

dolph Street, since renamed Martin

Luther King Drive.

"Us kids would run to the library every day after school," said Butler, 73, and a lifetime San Angelo resident. "The librarian's name was Ethyl Levert. She was highly respected, but she was very strict. She would tell us every day that there would be no 'acting up' in her library. And she would remind everyone that we weren't there to flirt with boys and girls."

The library, which ceased to operate as part of the Tom Green County Library System in 1972, is being giv-

en a second life, thanks to community leaders who joined forces to restore the building and plan to reopen the library in Sep-tember. Those leaders include Ronnie and Maria Hawkins, Craig and Sally Meyers, Larry Walker and Emilio Perez.

"We recently received a \$50,000 donation from the (San Angelo) Health Foundation to support the renovations." Ronnie renovations," Ronnie Hawkins said. "We're ex-cited about the project. It's a landmark that we. need to preserve.

"Hopefully it will at-tract young kids to get over here and use and appreciate it."

Renovations are exected to cost about

\$75,000.

When the library reopens, the books and propens grams will be about "90 percent" Afrocentric, Hawkins said. Everyone will be invited to use the li-brary, and many pro-grams will be designed to teach non-African-Americans about black history and culture.

Talks to restore the library began last year when the Northwest Lions Club began discussing whether to sell the property. The club had taken ownership of the building in the 1980s and used it for many years as a meeting

In recent years the financially strapped club couldn't afford to maintain the building and it began to deteriorate. Some of the more serious problems included broken windows and parts of the roof caying in. The club also could no longer af-ford to insure the build-

Some of the library's items have disappeared over the years, including sports trophies that once shone prominently in a glass showcase. But many books and magazines remain. The library's original shelving is in good condition and will be kept, Maria Hawkins said.

The most exciting find was a large armoire free-standing sturdy. wooden closet - built by slaves in the early 1800s Ronnie Hawkins said. It was donated to the library

The Hawkinses' have

temporarily taken over responsibility for the insurance. building's They also devised a plan to restore the building's exterior so it resembles its original appearance as much as possible. The goal is to obtain historical status for the library, Ma-ria Hawkins said.

The Meyerses are us-ing private donations and

volunteer labor to paint the interior, supply new lighting, refinish the ceil-ing and install new flooring in keeping with the

original interior.

When the library reopens it will feature the facility's original signage.

Ownership remains with the Lions Club, which is a nonprofit organization. After the library is restored, the Lions Club and Lions Charities will resume responsibility for funding and operations, including paying the in-surance, utilities and surance, utilities and maintenance, according to the organization's written agreement with the Hawkinses.

Sally Meyers, a retired librarian, is among several residents who have promised to donate spe-cialized collections of books and audiovisuals to

the library.
The plan is for Sally Meyers to serve as the librarian, Ronnie Hawkins said. Angelo State University also has agreed to provide a full-time volunteer to staff the library.







# Renovated Dunbar Library earns statewide recognition

The historic Dunbar Library has received the Wayne Williams Library Project of the Year award from the Texas Library Association.

The library, at Martin Luther King Drive and 10th Street, reopened in September after extensive renovations.

Built around 1939, the 600-square-foot building was home to the only library for San Angelo's black community during years of segregation. It had not been used as a library since 1972, after it ceased to operate as part of the Tom Green County Library System.

The award recognized the people and organizations that contributed to the library project for "the highest levels of achievement, professional standards, and inspiration to other libraries," according to the news release.

The Texas Library Association was established in 1902 to promote, support and improve library services in Texas.

The plaque and \$500 check was presented in early April to Sally Meyers, the Tom Green County chil-

Dunbar Library has been selected as the Wayne Williams Library Project of the Year by the Texas Library Association. This award is made in recognition of the project that exemplifies the highest levels of achievement, professional standards, and inspiration to other libraries.

The Texas Library Association was established in 1902 to promote, support, and improve library services in Texas. Now more than a century old, TLA is the largest state library association in the U.S. Its 7,000+ members are employed in all types of libraries: academic, public, school, and special. This year's conference *Perfecting Your Game, A Win for Your Community* was held April 3 through 7 in Dallas. The Award was presented during the first general session to Sally Meyers, Tom Green County Children's Librarian and Dunbar Library Board Member and Jill Donegan, Tom Green County Library Administrator. A check for \$500 from the Wayne Williams Foundations was included with the plaque.

#### **District 2A1 Retention Contest**

Last year our District lost 254 members because they decided to drop their membership in their Lions Club. The loss of these members meant we had less service in our communities, less support for our Disabled Children going to the Lions Camp, and less support for all the other good things we do.

The loss of most of these members who dropped could have been prevented. They drop for different reasons but the underlying reason is, "what they got out of being a member was not rewarding".

To encourage clubs to focus on retention, the District is implementing a retention contest. For the contest we have broken the clubs into 3 groups, Small membership, Medium membership, and Large membership. The contest will run through June 2020. The current District Governor and the District Governors for the following 2 years are committed to this program to strengthen our clubs.

Quarterly, the club with the best retention in each of the 3 size groups will be recognized at the District meeting and all the members will receive a Retention Pin. Each additional time a club wins the members will receive a chevron with a number on it representing how many time the club has won. Potentially, a club could have a chevron with 10 on it, meaning they won every quarter through June 2020.

If multiple clubs tie on having the fewest drops, we will recognize the club or clubs that tied but also have the most new members.

At the end of each year we will also recognize the club with fewest drops for the full year with an award of \$10.00 for each member. The club can decide how they want to use the money. They could use the money to buy an apparel item, have a club celebration party, take the members to a Lions Camp Friday night graduation event, or whatever fits their need.

IN 2017 TEXAS SAW THE HELP OF LCIF WHEN HURRICANE HARVEY DEVASTATED THE COAST AND HOUSTON AREA. A TASK FORCE WAS FORMED BY THE MD-2 COUNCIL OF GOVERNORS AND THE 4 MD DISTRICTS THAT WERE AFFECTED AND SO FAR LCIF HA\$ RECEIVED OVER \$916,000.00 IN DESIGNATED HURRICANE HARVEY CONTRIBUTIONS. THE TASK FORCE RECEIVED \$100,000 AS THE ORIGINAL CATASTROPHE GRANT WHICH WAS ALLOCATED \$25,000 PER DISTRICT WHICH AS BEEN SPENT ON EMERGENCY RELIEF ACTIVITIES. THE TASK FORCE ALSO RECEIVED \$60,000 AS THE HOLIDAY SPIRIT GRANT FOR PROVIDING ASSISTANCE TO FAMILIES AND CHILDREN FOR CHRISTMAS WHICH WAS ALLOCATED BETWEEN THE DISTRICTS. THE TASK FORCE HAS SUBMITTED ITS NEIGHBORHOOD RECONSTRUCTION GRANT FOR \$280,000 (\$70,000 PER DISTRICT) TO LCIF. THE PLAN IS TO ASSIST 20 HOMEOWNERS IN EACH DISTRICT WITH REPAIR COSTS OF MATERIALS NOT TO EXCEED \$3,000 PER HOMEOWNER. THIS HAS BEEN SUBMITTED TO LCIF FOR FINAL FAVORABLE APPROVAL. THE TASK FORCE ALSO RECEIVED APPROXIMATELY \$100,000 IN CONTRIBUTIONS FROM THE TEXAS LIONS FOUNDATION. THE HURRICANE IN PUERTO RICO ALSO RECEIVED A \$100,000 GRANT FROM LCIF PLUS ALL THE DONATIONS THAT CAME IN FOR THAT DISASTER.

LCIF IS ONE OF THE EIGHT CHARITIES THAT OUR DISTRICT 2-AI SUPPORTS BY THE 100% VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTIONS FROM THE 49 CLUBS IN OUR DISTRICT. FOR THE FIRST 6 MONTHS OF THIS YEAR 13 CLUBS HAVE BEEN 100%, ONE CLUB IS 200% AND ONE CLUB IS 1000%, 24 LIONS HAVE BECOME CONTRIBUTING MEMBERS, 3 MELVIN JONES FELLOWS WERE AWARDED TO DESERVING LIONS AND ONE TWO DIAMOND MELVIN JONES FELLOW PIN WAS AWARDED. WITH ALL THESE CONTRIBUTIONS AND DISASTER CONTRIBUTIONS BY CLUBS, DISTRICT 2-AI HAS GIVEN \$7522.00 TO LCIF. OUT OF THE 16 DISTRICTS, DISTRICT 2-AI IS IN 6<sup>th</sup> PLACE FOR GIVING. I WANT TO THANK EACH CLUB AND EACH LION WHO HAS SUPPORTED LCIF.
