Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) is excited to announce that District and Club Community Impact grants (DCG) will be available for application beginning in July 2018. Donations made by a club or a district during this current fiscal year will count toward the requirements for this new grant opportunity. Please note that funds raised by a club will remain in that club's account until the club notifies LCIF to apply the funds to the district's account. DCG offers a new opportunity for Lions to support humanitarian activities in their communities. Unlike all other LCIF programs, DCG initiative funding is provided to clubs and districts from their own contributions to the foundation. The program rewards both Lions donations to LCIF and Lions service projects that are in alignment with the Foundation's focal areas. All projects must be approved by LCIF.

As the end of the Lion year approaches, we want to remind you of this award and how your club or district may qualify:

- The program is available to both district and clubs.
- Under the program, 15 percent of unrestricted and/or general campaign donations will be available for DCGs.
- Only unrestricted and general campaign donations will qualify.
- Districts and clubs will be required to meet a minimum donation level to enable 15
  percent of their donation to be counted towards their available funds to be accessed
  through the DCG program.
  - For districts, the minimum cumulative donation amount is US\$10,000 per fiscal year.
  - For clubs, the minimum cumulative donation amount is US\$5,000 per fiscal year.

#### **District 2A1 Retention Contest**

Last year our District lost 254 members because they decided to drop their membership in their Lions Club. The loss of these members meant we had less service in our communities, less support for our Disabled Children going to the Lions Camp, and less support for all the other good things we do.

The loss of most of these members who dropped could have been prevented. They drop for different reasons but the underlying reason is, "what they got out of being a member was not rewarding".

To encourage clubs to focus on retention, the District is implementing a retention contest. For the contest we have broken the clubs into 3 groups, Small membership, Medium membership, and Large membership. The contest will run through June 2020. The current District Governor and the District Governors for the following 2 years are committed to this program to strengthen our clubs.

Quarterly, the club with the best retention in each of the 3 size groups will be recognized at the District meeting and all the members will receive a Retention Pin. Each additional time a club wins the members will receive a chevron with a number on it representing how many time the club has won. Potentially, a club could have a chevron with 10 on it, meaning they won every quarter through June 2020.

If multiple clubs tie on having the fewest drops, we will recognize the club or clubs that tied but also have the most new members.

At the end of each year we will also recognize the club with fewest drops for the full year with an award of \$10.00 for each member. The club can decide how they want to use the money. They could use the money to buy an apparel item, have a club celebration party, take the members to a Lions Camp Friday night graduation event, or whatever fits their need.

## HISTORY OF THE EARLY DAYS OF MASON COUNTY

(Copied from a story written by Marvin Hunter, edited by Gail Coldiron)

In 1849 during President Taylor's administration, the Federal government established a line of forts from the Red River to the mouth of the Rio Grande at a distance of forty miles apart to encourage the settlement of the southwestern border of Texas.

In early 1851, Major William J. Hardee led 200 troops from the 2<sup>nd</sup> Dragoons on a scout to locate the site for a new fort between the Pedernales and Colorado rivers. The expedition recognized the natural advantages of a hill just south of the present town of Mason near a free-flowing spring and selected that site for Fort Mason. The post was likely named in honor of 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt George T. Mason, killed in Brownsville during the Mexican War.

The post was formally established on July 6, 1851. Major H. W. Merrill and four companies of soldiers began working on the fort, but it was not completed for two years. From the time of Merrill's arrival until the time of the outbreak of the Civil War, the fort was constantly garrisoned by from two to eight companies of soldiers, depending on the ever-changing hostilities of the Indians about it. Before the soldiers came into this country, no white man had ever visited it. The Kiowa, Apache and Comanche Indians, the buffalo, antelope and deer had been the only inhabitants. The tribes resented the intrusion of the white man and very soon they took the warpath against them.

The nearest settlement to Fort Mason was Fredericksburg, established by a colony of German emigrants who had left their homeland for a more prosperous life in America. Many of these emigrants were revolutionists who were forced to leave Germany because of their apparent radical views. Many of their descendants fought in the World Wars. One soldier, of whom all Texans are proud, was Louis Jordan, the first Texan officer to fall in action in France and was one of the first eighty picked men to be sent from Texas to the front lines.

In the late 1840s, the State of Texas would give a grant of 640 acres to any settlers who wanted to live in this frontier area. However, life was hard and many of the earliest settlers died of starvation, were killed by the Indians, or died of disease, caused by lack of nourishment and other terrible privations. Approximately fifteen families received a grant for lands in the southern portion of Mason County, then part of Gillespie County. However, these settlers were compelled to wait until the soldiers had arrived before they could take possession.

About 1853, several German and American families took up homesteads around Fort Mason. These men included William Greenwood, C. Milligan, Bick Lee Todd, Peters, Louis Martin, the Gamels and the Vandevers.

Later, in 1855 and 1856, the Kothmanns, Leifestes, Jordans, Lemburgs, Simons, Kneesses, Hasses, Behrens, Ellebrachts and others comprised the small band of settlers in this untamed land. Henry Hoerster claimed to be the first white child born in Mason County.

These earliest settlers suffered greatly from the predations of the local Indians, who knew that their way of life was seriously threatened by these new Texans. The Indians could destroy the fruits of many days' toil in the wink of an eye and sweep away to safety with bands of stolen horses and cattle.

Each family made a little altar in their cabin and each cabin served as a church. The meetings were held in a cycle and the entire populace attended them. Reverend C. A. Grote, and Mr. Pluenneke were both pioneer ministers who rode the circuit throughout the Central Texas area.

Mason County had no regular mail service until 1857 when two post offices were established. One was established at Hedwigs Hill in the charge of Charles Martin and the other was three miles from the fort at the home of G. W. Todd, the postmaster. Later Todd's post office was moved to Mason where Miss Maria Crosby became postmistress with W. C. Lewis as deputy. Miss Crosby soon became the wife of William Wheeler.

In 1858, Mason County was organized as an independent county by G. W. Todd and commissioned by Governor Sam Houston. The first marriage license was issued to W. C. Lewis and Mrs. Celia Head and the first deed transferred a slave, old Sam Peters, from Major J. S. Peters to G. W. Todd.

During the decade from 1850 to 1860, Fort Mason was commanded by Robert E. Lee, Albert Sydney Johnston and Thomas, the Majors Van Dorn and Crosby, and several others. Colonel Robert E. Lee was in the U.S. Army at the time he was stationed at Fort Mason. Nothing remains to mark the spot where the old fort

stood. At the base of the hill on the north side is the spring from which the garrison secured water. Thus, from a chance location of a camp and the erection of a fort, grew the present town of Mason, Texas.

Among the first residents of Mason were James E. Ranck, Major David Doole, William Koock, Christie Crosby, Wilson Hey and many others.

About the time Mason County was organized, a settlement sprang up in the southeastern part of the county and J.O. von Meusebach laid out a town called Loyal Valley, which for a number of years was the largest town in Mason County. Among the town's buildings were the Buchmeir Hotel, the Christian Keyser Home, the Hans Marshall dwelling and the little rock school house that is still in use. Some of the leading citizens were Henry Keyser, William Kidd, Ship Martin, Dan Martin, Henry Dye, Bob Moseley, Mrs. Buchmeir and others.

When the Civil War came on in 1861, the troops stationed at Fort Mason were needed at more important points and the settlers were left at the mercy of the hostile Indians, who lost no time in harassing and killing the unprotected settlers. The locals responded by organizing the Minute Men, whose duty it was to be prepared to pursue and fight the Indians at a minute's notice. Some time earlier, a Ranger company was formed of men from San Saba, Llano, Burnett and Mason Counties. For a time, this company was encamped in both the town of San Saba and Camp San Saba, located in southern McCullough County. This company was mustered into the Confederate Army in 1863. The years of 1863 and 1864 were the most trying of all as the Indians were particularly active.

Tragically during this time, Indians killed Mrs. Todd, wife of G. W. Todd, near Todd Mountain, five miles southeast of Mason, and carried off her daughter, Alice Todd. Also, Indians killed Jim Biddie and captured two Lehmann boys, Herman and Willie. Willie managed to escape and returned to his home, but Herman was kept a captive for nine years. Adolph Korn was captured by the Comanches in Mason County and was held in captivity several years.

In 1866, the government again sent troops to Fort Mason and new settlers came pouring into the County. Raids by the Indians continued as late as 1873. In 1866, a tri-weekly mail service was established, which continued until 1869, when a daily mail ran from San Antonio to El Paso. Fine old Concord stage-coaches arrived at Mason from Fort McKavitt, Fort Concho, and other posts. About that time Van and Lace Bridges, Lockhart, Taylor, William Koock, and Major Hunter settled in Mason. From that time onward, many came to stay, others to leave again, and for many years the population of Mason was very unstable.

The original county seat was located three miles from Fort Mason, but a vote was taken to move the county seat to the Fort and James E. Ranck, owner of the land adjoining the fort, became active in a campaign to draw settlers to Mason. He had the land plotted into lots and streets and slowly Fort Mason began to grow.

In 1869, John Gamel and John Schuessler erected the first stone structures, which were later followed by those of J. D. Bridges and Ben F. Gooch. In 1875, James Ranck built the first stone storehouse plus the store buildings of D. Doole in the western part of town and William Koock at Koocksville, one mile from Mason.

In 1861, the Block House was built 18 miles from Mason near the San Saba River by W. G. Lewis and Olive Merrill. Major Peters' Negroes cut and hewed the timber for this building. It was built for a ranch house with the view to ranching William Greenwood's cattle, but when Mrs. Todd was killed by Indians, Lewis gave up the idea of ranching. A few rangers were quartered at the ranch house for a while and after they left, travelers often sheltered there.

In 1872, the Lutherans built a little church of their own, which was also used as a schoolhouse. Jacob Schuessler was the donor of the lot and a charter member of the church.

The citizens of Beaver Creek built the first real schoolhouse in the county, which is still standing. Mr. Bierschwale was the first schoolmaster of this school.

The first courthouse was finished in 1875 and was burned in 1877. Another courthouse was then built but it was later torn down and replaced by the present courthouse. The county jail stood on the courthouse square for many years, but in 1894 this was torn down and a new jail was built on the south side of the square.
